Neighborhood Traffic Management Program Request Form

The City of Stockton is taking action to address traffic issues through a community-based Neighborhood Traffic Management Program (NTMP). The goal of the NTMP is to improve safety and the quality-of-life for residents by reducing the impacts from speeding vehicles, cut-thru traffic, and careless drivers. The goal is met through providing neighborhood residents with the education and information necessary to become active participants in addressing their neighborhood-identified traffic issues. implementing traffic calming techniques and effective engineering principles, and targeted police enforcement.

NTMP Request Forms are received continuously, and neighborhoods are placed on the waiting list within the appropriate city quadrant (northwest, northeast, southwest, southeast) in the order received. The goal is to select the two highest ranking neighborhoods from each quadrant each year to participate in the NTMP based on available funding.

Once a neighborhood is selected, all residents of the neighborhood will be invited to attend a neighborhood meeting. At the meeting, interested Draw a street diagram that shows the boundaries of your neighborhood

residents can volunteer to participate on a Traffic Calming Committee for their neighborhood. Committee members meet monthly and develop a proposed traffic calming plan for their neighborhood. Depending on the traffic calming program chosen (Full Program or the faster Speed Hump and Speed Cushion Program), it could take 3 to 6 months to develop the traffic calming plan.
